

DSTC WATES VISIT

n Friday 28th June, Mr Law and Mrs Donegan-Edwards took 21 Year 8 students to London for a STEM day in aid of INWED - International Women in Engineering Day. We started by heading to the Emmanuel Centre to listen to STEM lectures on robotics, the bloodhound ssc - the car that can go faster than the speed of sound and also the ocean. We watched videos of how robotics have developed so quickly in such a short space of time and saw that a plastic bag had made its way to the deepest part of the ocean.

After the lectures, we caught the tube across town to explore the world of construction, architecture and project management at Wates Construction in the King's Road area of London. The students were able to experience real life work scenarios and met employees of various roles that make up a large construction company. Our students completed some 'hands on practical tasks and were taken to one of the sites where they saw parts of a building being constructed. DSTC YEAR 7 FORD VISIT

As a part of the International Women in Engineering Day, our Year 7s visited Ford to get some hands on experience with engineering at one of the largest automobile companies in the country. Throughout the day the students tackled a number of exciting STEM challenges designed to give them a flavour of what it is like to work at Ford and in the engineering sector as a whole.

The challenges that the students completed, with flying colours, ranged from rocket design and launching to assembly line production of automobiles that had to pass extremely strict success criteria. Students also experienced a talk about the role of women in STEM and why it is so important for our students to get involved. Another challenge that the students completed was that of programming self-driving robots which were then tested on a mini road mat. After getting to grips with the coding language, and getting some expert pointers from the professional Ford robotics programmers, our students had programmed their robots to respond to a number of different environmental and time based cues and successfully completed their missions to get their robots around a course without hitting obstacles. Some of our students went even further and managed to get their robot to complete an entire lap of the circuit given to them which received a high level of praise from the programmers present who were very impressed.

We finished our day with a tour of the Ford facilities where they test emissions and how the cars they design stand up to environmental conditions before finally being taken on a lap of the test track. The engineers took the time to show the students how the cars work at different speeds and at different inclines as well as going through some of the complicated technology used to ensure all of their cars meet such high standards. Overall, our students were wonderful ambassadors for the school, really impressed throughout their challenges and all seemed excited to return in the future. Our thanks go to Ford for hosting us and for taking the time to run the challenges that our students gained so much from.

DSTC HISTORY EXCURSIONS

During the Easter break Year 11 GCSE History students visited the Clink Museum in London to discover how this famous prison changed over time. It complemented their learning for their exam paper on Crime and Punishment. After the Clink Museum visit, we travelled by underground to Whitechapel where we were guided around the sites of the notorious Jack the Ripper murders. This is a hot topic for the GCSE exam. The tour is a popular experience and we took Year 10 Historians on the same 'Ripper Tour' this term. The girls enjoyed the guides but were also struck by how Whitechapel contrasts with the nearby City of London. They were particularly excited by the selfie opportunities offered by the landmarks and the glorious summer evening light.

The History department took 48 Year 8 girls to visit Dover Castle in June. College staff ensured the girls experienced as much of the history on the site as





possible, from the Roman ruins to the 1940s underground hospital and the medieval castle itself. Castle staff commented on the impeccable behaviour of the girls on several occasions, they were a credit to the College. We look forward to making castle visits a regular event for girls studying History in KS3.

DSTC BUSHCRAFT

A t the beginning of the May half term, 55 Year 7s spent a weekend at Bushcraft. This is the third year we have organised this team-building activity and the girls always seem to throw themselves into it and end up having an unforgettable time. Being the largest group we have taken, we had to go to a new site near Chichester on the South Downs which meant a slightly longer journey than before but they still managed to fit in several activities before settling down for their first night under canvas.

On the Saturday, the girls set about building survival shelters with help and advice from their tribe leaders. The results were so good that several of the girls elected to spend the night in them rather than in their tents – and they lasted all night despite some rain!

Over the weekend the girls learned many bushcraft skills and we even had a 'Bushcraft's Got Talent' on the Saturday night. We returned home on the Sunday with a coachload of very tired but happy girls who have a much better chance of being able to survive should they ever find themselves lost in the woods!





DSTC SPORTS LEADERS

On 3rd July 2019, the Year 10 Sports Leaders had another opportunity to improve their officiating skills by helping at the Primary Schools' Boccia Competition. Boccia is a game similar to bocce, played by competitors who have a physical disability that requires the use of a wheelchair but is also open to able bodied athletes.

The competition had pupils with hearing and physical disabilities. The girls had to check the players stayed in their seat when throwing and had to decide which Boccia balls were closest each game and communicate all this with the players.

The girls even had the chance to try out some sign language with the deaf pupils. The girls were very professional and kept score perfectly, they also gave the medals out at the mini medal ceremony which was a lovely end to the event.
