Taylor delivered a fun, upbeat and challenging workshop, teaching the repertoire from The Brits performance he was in with 'Mabel'.



I started playing football when I was five-years-old, when my dad took me along to the Grassroots football club in Longfield. I played there for the next two to three years on Saturday mornings and is where my passion for football began. I was subsequently scouted by Gillingham football club, who I remained playing for until March 2020. Shortly after, the club released all female academy players and members of the women's football squad due to financial difficulties arising from the Covid-19 pandemic.





Although this was a setback, I was confident in my own ability and believed this wouldn't be the end of my journey playing football to an elite level. Fortunately, the coaching staff and parents involved at Gillingham F.C. started a new club (London City Lionesses), which meant I didn't have to wait long before I was playing again. It was a real bonus reunite with the players and coaches I had previously worked with at Gillingham.

It was around this time that I was selected for trials with Kent SFA. Pleasingly, I was selected to represent my county after a really challenging three-stage selection process; I have been playing regularly ever since. As great as this achievement was, it turned out that this wasn't to be the pinnacle of my football achievements.

Every year, each county nominates their top five players to attend trials for the national team. This year, I was one of the five Kent players who attended. Over several months, this entailed me attending a South-East trial, a South of England trial and, finally, a 'South -v- North' trial at Lilleshall, during which the best players were selected to play for the England under-15 team. This whole process was extremely gruelling, both physically and mentally for me and all those involved.

Before Christmas, I received a letter telling me that I had been successful and was now officially part of the England under-15 team. I was so pleased that all of my hard work had paid off. I'm excited to have been selected and can't wait to get going! I must say that I fully recognise that I couldn't have achieved any of this without the support of my Mum and Dad, my siblings and all of the coaches that I have worked with since I began playing almost ten years ago. I'm truly thankful for all of their consistent support and encouragement over the years.

CAREERS: KS3 EDUCATION AND CHILDCARE FOCUS MORNING

On 21st March we had the pleasure of holding our first large-scale, in-person Careers event since 2020.

Representatives from Early Years childcare, Primary and Secondary education took time out of their busy schedules to talk to our students in years 7, 8 and 9. They spoke about their current roles and the varied pathways they took to get where they are today.

Miss Cherry from Rainbow Day Nursery told students how she came to be working in the childcare sector after being made redundant twice during the Pandemic. She joined the nursery in November 2020 and has since completed her Level 2 childcare qualification whilst working full time. She advised the students that there are further levels to this qualification which she can take, as she progresses in her role. Miss Cherry was very honest about the challenges within her job but emphasised how rewarding it is and how she especially enjoys working with the children who have Special Educational Needs.

Mr Hudson from Westgate Primary School impressed the students with his previous career as a professional dancer in Disneyland. He talked about his route as a mature student - taking an Access Course at North West Kent College, before studying for his degree through the University of Greenwich. He became a Higher Level Teaching Assistant at Westgate Primary, before gaining his Teaching Qualification. Mr Hudson explained how he loves his job - with all its ups and downs - especially the 'lightbulb moments' with his students.







Our very own Ms Lazell shared her 'very winding' career path to becoming a Geography teacher at DSTC. She discussed her early setback when a school adviser said that her grades weren't good enough for her dream job as a Meteorologist. She then left school and had a short time in College, before going into full time employment. Ms Lazell worked in a variety of roles but she felt that none of them challenged her enough.

However, they all helped her to build a number of the skills she needs for teaching today. She also became a mature student, following a similar route to Mr Hudson. As part of her degree she presented History days at a Primary school with her tutor. This made her realise she wanted to be a teacher but that she would prefer to teach older students. This decision was confirmed when she undertook work experience at a Secondary school. Ms Lazell said that the setback she experienced at school, has made her want to ensure that every student at DSTC has the opportunity to follow their dreams and get the support they need to reach their full potential. She also emphasised that it is important to work hard and gain your qualifications in school, as they will be needed for any career you want to pursue in the future.

Students in all year groups greatly enjoyed this event - here is a sample of their very positive feedback:


Are you a fan of Harry Potter?


Did you know that Harry Potter's books have sold more than 400 million copies worldwide and been translated into more than 60 languages?

DSTC Students have already entered the competition and now, parents and/or carers it is your turn to challenge yourself!






























MFL: FOOD CHALLENGE

"I enjoyed this experience because it gave me the idea on what I could say and how I would respond to questions in a restaurant. Next time I might improve on memorising my lines and adding detail."


"I enjoyed the activity as it was a fun way to practice speaking Spanish in front of a crowd."

ST GILES TRUST VISIT

This half term, our KS4 and KS5 students had a very special assembly from the "St Giles Trust". One of our students has written her account of the assembly:

The assembly itself was very strong. It made me realise how life isn't as bad as I think it is. The speakers Richard and Aisha had mind changing stories that are crazy and honestly scary. I am going to start with explaining what County Lines are and how they relate to drug dealing. County Lines is a form of criminal exploitation where gangs persuade, coerce or force young people to transfer drugs and money, deal drugs and transport them to big towns and cities in England. County lines isn't just an English or UK issue – this happens all around the world. County Lines and drug dealing has become a massive issue in the UK over the last 10–20 years. In this assembly I observed and was shocked by what I heard and the trauma that Richard and Aisha went through.



This is Richard's story - Richard grew up in an abusive and painful household with just his Mum who used substances. Richard had a dream to be a footballer so he would constantly be on the pitch. He used it as an escape from what was happening at home. When Richard started Secondary school he wouldn't go straight home, he would go to football practice but then he would stay out until 11pm at night even though his football practice finished at 6pm. Due to him being out at that time he fell into the wrong crowd. He didn't want to hang around his estate because he knew his Mum would see him, so he went to a friends' instead. These friends smoked substances and Richard eventually took part too. When he was 14, he was asked by one of these friends to sell some illegal substances for him.

Richard thought that these people were his family, so he said that he would do it. That one act of selling made him fall deeper into this world. He was given false promises, such as being taken to a fancy apartment. He was fed more lies, such as being told he would receive £100 a day for a 14 year old. The 'fancy apartment' turned out to be a 'trap house' (a drug users home). These houses have no water, smell disgusting and Richard had to live there for what he thought was only going to be a week - it turned out to be a month. Richard was given a second phone and instructions to answer it and make the illegal drug sales. This meant that he had to be on alert 24/7, for 24-48 hours straight without sleep. He barely showered and was constantly looking behind his back. Richard was groomed at the age of 14 to work effectively as a slave for a drug dealer. He was never paid.

Grooming is very common - people often don't know that they are being groomed. There are several main stages of grooming. Targeting, friendship, a loving relationship and then an abusive relationship. These stages are very difficult to notice especially if you are being groomed. You just feel like a person is being nice and cares about you. People who get groomed are commonly vulnerable or have additional needs. People who have nothing to lose or who have adverse childhood experiences are also commonly targeted.

As a Criminology student, this assembly has made me understand that groomers will target anyone. County Lines are scary and dangerous, they need to be spoken about more because I didn't even know it existed. It's made me have a whole new outlook on society.

HEALTHY CHINESE CUISINE AMBASSADORS

Look out for their forthcoming performance in the summer! They have such a lot of talent and we certainly have some stars among us.










NATIONAL CAREERS WEEK 2022




In Individual Character Education lessons (ICE), our students engaged with the "National Careers Service" skills self-assessment. It is a very insightful activity that allows students to answer various scenarios and questions, resulting in a number of recommended careers. This was a fascinating activity with many students being presented with ideas that they hadn't thought of exploring. Students also used the time to develop their "careers tracker" that shows all the careers engagement they have had across the last 18 months. Year 11-13 students also watched interviews with young people currently undertaking apprenticeships, gaining further insight in to this very popular and engaging method of training.





Across the Science and Maths departments, students watched a series of live seminars about careers in STEM subjects. These included talks from engineers, chemists and digital experts. These virtual engagements meant our students could listen to key experts in STEM fields.
