
Thanks to all of you. Have a fantastic summer and we will see returning students on the 2nd September 2022.

HIGH ASPIRATIONS CAREERS DAY

In collaboration with our Enterprise Adviser Susan Pearson, and Lara Pool from the Ebbsfleet Development Corporation, we hosted a 'High Aspirations' careers event for all students in Years 7-9 on 15th June 2022.

This event aimed to break gender stereotypes across a range of career sectors and encourage our students to reach their full potential. Students heard from inspirational women who have achieved success in a traditionally male dominated area and were able to interact with them to learn more about their education and career paths. Students also received advice about the qualifications required and apprenticeship opportunities available within a number of the sectors represented.

Years 8 and 9 moved between classrooms on a carousel basis, visiting each speaker and learning about their career paths and current role. Students then had the opportunity to ask questions, some of which they had prepared in advance.

In the afternoon, the event moved to the Hall for the Year 7s. The speakers introduced themselves, then students circulated around the hall, visiting each one and asking questions. After this, students sat down and each speaker returned to the front of the hall and asked students questions, to find out what they had learned about them and their jobs/career sector.







Speakers included:

Susan Pearson - who runs her own HR Consultancy business

Hannah Smith - who plays professional rugby for Harlequins

Lara Pool - from EDC, responsible for the Ebbsfleet Garden City project

Juliana Lucena - from Techary, a company which helps businesses procure, implement and support technology across the world.

Melloney Harvey - from Artisan, which restores decorative plasterwork in historical buildings.

Lucy Sparks - from Arcadis, whose current project is the Lower Thames Crossing.

Becca Collins - from Construction Youth Trust, which is a charity that educates, trains and inspires young people to help them build better futures in the construction industry

Shauneen Fowler - from Sian Formwork, a large local construction company.

Feedback from the students about the speakers at event was very positive:

"they were relatable and actually made it desirable to work in the jobs they do and they are inspirational for being able to persevere in a male dominated work force"

"you could really tell that they wanted us to realise how much they loved their jobs"

"They inspired me by telling be to keep going even if the road gets tough"

"I liked the way we could communicate with different people from different occupations"

"All the ladies told us how passionate they are about their jobs"

"Hearing about different jobs that I wouldn't think of doing"

"Learning about different career paths and what you need to do to get there"

"Learning about different job opportunities for the future and that being a women doesn't sop you from getting a career in a male dominated area."

Another positive outcome from the day was that 50% of students said that the event had helped them to consider new career choices. We are so proud at DSTC to empower our students to become citizens of the future!









SICILY TRIP 2022

DSTC ACTIVITY DAYS 2022

After a two year hiatus, we were very excited for the return of our DSTC Activity Days, that was, until we saw the weather forecast! Despite the unbelievable heatwave, we had an action-packed couple of days thanks to the excellent planning and contingencies put in place by the venues, as well as the support and conduct of our students and staff.

Year 7 went to Hever Castle and they all had a thoroughly good time, getting wet in the water maze and then looking around the childhood home of Anne Boleyn. Students that didn't go to Hever Castle spent the day in school taking part in three arts and crafts workshop, making origami and attempted candle holders. They then moved on to a clay workshop and gratitude journaling, run by our wonderful partners at the University of Creative arts (UCA). On Tuesday, Year 7 had a space themed day where they were able to visit the astrodome, an inflatable dome where the night sky is projected on the top and listened to a talk from a STEM ambassador from the Royal Observatory in Greenwich

Some of the students went to Howletts Wild Animal Park where they saw lemurs, tigers, elephants and a couple of gorillas. A highlight was being sprayed with water-misters by the teachers to keep cool! The students in school had a display from 'The Owl and Raptor Centre' from Groombridge place who brought in owls and raptors and taught the students about their habitats and how they find their prey. They then had an interactive talk from the People's Dispensary for Sick Animals (PDSA), an animal charity, where the students learnt about animal heroes and caring for animals.

The second day for Year 8 was themed around preparing for their Duke of Edinburgh Award, which they will be able to start in Year 9. Students learnt about the countryside code and did some research on the skills, volunteering and physical sections and also practised map-reading in the form of an escape room.

Year 9 had great fun improving their team work by participating in 'Taskmaster' challenges and working their way through various communications scenarios. They were due to be going to Thorpe Park but unfortunately it had to be postponed due to the severe heat warning. Instead they did some fashion and architecture challenges at home. We are looking forward to next Year's Activity days and of course, that trip to Thorpe Park!

The finale had the audience clapping and cheering the cast who all thoroughly deserved their round of applause."









THE SCHOLAR'S CLUB

DSTC is celebrating the success of 10 students as they graduate from The Scholars Programme, a national university access programme. Megan, Phoebe, Kiki, Soraya Rose, Annatullah, Chloe, Rebecca, Ashyln, Milena and Maya were encouraged to think and work independently across seven tutorials with a subject expert PhD researcher.

During the programme, they learnt about Roman Britain and then completed a challenging final essay which was given a university-level grade.

The Scholars Programme, run by UK-wide university access charity The Brilliant Club, supports students aged 8-18 to develop the knowledge, skills and confidence needed to progress to the country's most competitive universities and succeed once there.

By bringing together two communities – PhD researchers and students – who might otherwise never interact with each other, young people can study innovative and inspiring topics which very few people have ever covered.

The Scholars Programme has enabled our students to learn beyond the core curriculum and helped them to develop key skills for university and use later in life, such as critical thinking.







Beyond their graduation, these students have lots more to look forward to because the programme has a proven impact on university progression rates. For the sixth year running, independent UCAS evaluation has found that Scholars Programme graduates are significantly more likely to progress to a competitive university compared with students from similar backgrounds who have not completed the programme (56% vs. 37%).

Annatullah commented on her experience:

"This program was a very challenging thing for me to do but it was easy to overcome all my struggles with the help of my tutor and my peers. This program was very eye opening. I definitely enjoyed this experience and encourage others to participate"

Megan commented on her experience:

"I learnt that university is not just all about work and essays but you get a social life as well. You can go to the library and hang out with friends or you can do clubs like tennis or drama"

Anne-Marie Canning MBE, CEO at The Brilliant Club, congratulated the pupils on their achievements:

"Congratulations to these outstanding students as they graduate from The Scholars Programme. They join a community of over 90,000 young people who have taken part in The Brilliant Club since 2011. Completing their final assignments was no doubt challenging, but it has shown that these students have a passion for learning and the knowledge to produce university-style work already. I hope they use these new skills throughout their education and continue their fantastic work."
